Registration is open for this compelling adult enrichment scheduled to begin April 12.

Overview

Hungry for Change explores the true meaning of the phrase "you are what you eat." This 6-week discussion course challenges participants to examine their roles, not only as consumers of food, but also as creators -- of food, of systems, and of the world we all live in. Each session includes readings, short assignments and accompanying discussion questions that address the impact of individual food choices on a range of issues, including ecosystem health, the treatment of factory and farm workers, and the global economy. Hungry for Change helps participants commit to lasting change by developing and sharing personal Action Plans with each session.

Acting Minister's Messages - March 5, 2012

Dear UUCR friends,



I recently visited with someone from the church, and as I was getting ready to leave I noticed a shawl hanging on the back of a chair in the kitchen. It was made of various tones of green yarn and looked so silky and soft that I walked over and touched it. When I complimented my hostess on the shawl, she told me the Creative Hands and Caring Hearts group from church had made it for her and brought it over recently when she was sick. I was struck by her gratitude for the caring gift from the church during a time of struggle, and the generosity of the folks who made and delivered what was a truly beautiful symbol.

Matthew Fox in *Sins of the Spirit, Blessings of the Flesh* writes: "Generosity is about giving without a guaranteed return — it is about the 'giveaway.'"

And this is important, because generosity -- the kind of giving we see in our church every day in things like the making and delivering of a shawl -- giving without expecting a guaranteed return, is our natural response to having been blessed with other gifts. Becoming aware of our blessings is the crucial element. Gratitude and appreciation lead to generosity, to a pay-it-forward kind of giving, rather than a perspective of paying a bill for services received.

Our annual pledge drive to support the programs and ministries of this church will culminate in two weeks on March 18, Commitment Sunday. If you were in the sanctuary this past Sunday, you noticed the beautiful cloth flames rising from chalices along the arches that frame our chancel. And perhaps the two along the side walls as well. And you would certainly have seen the gorgeous new cloth hanging on the front of the podium, a bright flame on a black background.

These flames remind us to consider how this church has sparked our spiritual lives and growth. It's common for folks to approach church pledge drives from the perspective of 'what's in it for me'? As a religious consumer, what do I get? This is such a natural way to think about things. But it isn't the spark of

generosity that comes from remembering the gifts we have received from a community that we would love to be able to share with others. As we move toward Commitment Sunday, where we hope our entire community will join together in a shared time of commitment and celebration, I hope you will reflect on how this church has ignited, sparked or transformed you. And then, think about how wonderful it is that we can do the same for others. Appreciation, gratitude, generosity. What a wonderful cycle to be a part of!

- 3/5/12 The Borders We Cross



Continued observations from the Interim Director of Faith Development:

Have you seen the graphic floating around the internet lately? In the frame there is a tiny circle with an arrow pointing to it with the words, "YOUR COMFORT ZONE." Also in the frame, separate from that tiny circle is a bigger circle – four times as large. Inside that circle are the words, "WHERE THE MAGIC HAPPENS." This playful little doodle is a complete narrative on our very human tendency. Doesn't this speak a powerful truth that describes our daily quests and challenges?

We often yearn to make changes that will improve the quality of our livelihood and perhaps especially, our relationships. And so it should not come as a surprise that within us lives a very time-tested and complex immune system to change. Recently I have had two significant opportunities to confront the sometimes-thick wall of my own comfort zone.

In late February, I took a day-long workshop led by developmental psychologist Robert Keegan. The roomful of about 75 professionals in varied fields was guided through an innovative activity he co-authored called Immunity to Change. By the end of the day each of us had a piece of paper – a map – in hand that clearly illustrated a methodical trajectory of understanding and hope to nudge just one of our long-held growing edges. I carried my map of new-found awareness with me in my travels that began the next day.

My week in the Southwest was a time for reflection and research. In the El Paso, Texas/Ciudad Juarez, Mexico border region, there is a compelling and startling and complex intersection of ethical and economic issues, politics and policies, human rights and survival. I have made this journey almost yearly in the past decade. By spending time with people I have come to know who accompany the migrant, homeless, and economically vulnerable peoples of the border region, I am reminded of how daily acts of faith are as important as the mega-vitamins I take each morning. By witnessing acts of hospitality, advocacy, and education, I am reminded that my own comfort zone is temporal if not inconsequential unless my daily path contains concrete extensions of my inner thoughts of peace and justice.

In our congregational life, we encounter very concrete instances when we are asked to look around the corner of our own perspective. Sometimes we don't understand what we see or even like what we think we are seeing. Yet we can remind ourselves and each other that belonging to a place such as UUCR affords us the opportunity to be guides for each other, with each other. Being in a community means we are never alone. Being in community means that we must commit to taking the time to understand and sometimes adapt quickly in order to meet the yearnings of the whole.

I am reminded of words from Buddha, "Your work is to discover your work and then with all your heart to give yourself to it." When we are all doing this, we *are* where the **magic happens**.

President's Messages - Commitment Sunday March 18



Commitment Sunday on March 18th is quickly approaching. That's the day when we will join together in celebration to renew our commitment to and financial support for our wonderful church home.

Hopefully you have received your beautiful brochure and accompanying letter in the mail, brought to you by the Annual Budget Drive committee, being chaired this year by George Marinakis and Matt Wilson. Please read through these materials and consider what role UUCR plays in your life and how you are able to support it with your financial pledge. Then come to church on March 18th with the pledge card provided to you in that packet. Reverend John Gibbons from the UU Bedford church will be our guest minister that morning. With the support of our Annual Budget Drive committee, we will be providing you with some yummy eats at coffee hour after both services where you can turn in your pledge card.

This year, we need to raise \$ 450,000 during our annual budget drive in order to support our annual operating budget which, with our growing congregation and expanding programs, has passed \$ 500,000 for the first time. Your brochure provides a pie chart showing the breakdown of income and expenses related to this budget. There are 3 areas which I'd like to bring to your attention in particular, where additional funds are imperative in our ability to effectively maintain our church staff and campus.

- We do not currently pay our minister and other staff members average/fair compensation.
- Our central office staff must rely on an ancient telephone and computer system which greatly impedes their effectiveness.
- We have put-off much needed building maintenance on all 3 buildings in our campus for years.

Our mission calls upon us to not only support and maintain our existing programs and resources but to grow them and reach beyond our doors to the world outside, sharing our unique perspectives and gifts. Your generous gift will

enable us to do so. This year, consider how your pledge may support these program and initiatives:

- Our Faith Development Program is growing in strength and numbers with more children and families becoming involved in the program.
- Our Social Action Program directly impacts the lives of others in our community and world, including our 2-year food-focused 'Planting Seeds' initiative.
- Plans are in the works to develop Public Relations mechanisms to get the word out about all the wonderful goings-on here at UUCR and to develop a Marketing Team who will reach out to particular demographics, letting them know about the tremendous resources available at UUCR.

So who financially supports the Annual Budget Drive? You do. And I do. And everyone else who sits in the pews does. It is our shared responsibility to make this church operate and provide the programs and resources that we all need and through which we can nurture our spirits and help heal our world.

How much money should you contribute? That's entirely up to you but I do ask that you consider the fact that we need to exceed last year's average pledge amount of \$ 2,250 to reach our goal. If you are currently pledging under this amount, please consider increasing your pledge as close to \$ 2,250, as you are able. If you are currently pledging over this amount, please consider increasing your pledge by 10 % to ensure that we are able to meet our goals.

Our faith and varied experiences touch us in so many ways. In preparation for our collective offering, we invite you to reflect on what fires your commitment to this wondrous place.

Website News - Church Email

This is the second in a series of news articles providing insight in the the technical aspects of our church's new website and associated services.

The church's hosting provider provides email service for the church staff and for church electronic mailing lists. In addition to a number of email accounts for some staff members, the email service provides dozens of forwarding addresses for the church, including email forwarding for the President and other members of the Governing Board, various staff members who prefer to receive email somewhere other than a church email account, and email forwarding for a number of church programs, teams, committees and task forces.

The church website software provides a sophisticated Contact Form feature, which provides the ability for visitors to send email to individuals or team leaders without exposing the destination email addresses publicly. This helps cut down on the amount of spam that church volunteers and staff receive as a result of their work with the church. The church website software also has the capability of providing Contact Forms that are secured using Captcha, a technology that helps prevent spammers from automating spamming via Contact Forms.

As is standard practice for low-cost service providers today, the church is subject to a quota of at most 750 emails per hour, to protect our domain from be

classified as a spam generator. The church uses special mailing list software that has the ability to re-queue church newsletter distributions that are interrupted by this quota.
